# Dear Neighbors,

As we enter the 2021 fire season, now is a good time to work on maintaining defensible space and getting organized in the event of an evacuation!

# An example of Defensible Space

Working!

In late June, a fire invaded the Auburn property of the Assistant Deputy Director of the CAL FIRE Office of the State Fire Marshal. But the defensible space he had created stopped the fire cold. As reported in the Auburn Journal, the Deputy Director had cleared an area of weeds in his backyard 50 feet from his house in February. They grew back, and he cleared the area again in April. Grass ignited near a

roadway, which continued creeping toward the Deputy Director's home. As crews from several agencies battled three of the four spot fires 1.5 miles apart (a passerby put out the fourth fire 10 feet by 10 feet), the fire approaching the Deputy Director's home literally ran out of fuel where he had created the home's defensible space.

While this fire wasn't a large one, we need to realize that the vast majority of fires in our County are farily small and the work we do to create defensible space often is the difference between keeping fires small and letting them become catastrophic.

#### **Recent Neighborhood Sightings**

#### - folks reducing wildfire risk

As part of the national Wildfire Community Preparedness Day activities on May



1, a crew of neighbors along Twitchell Road (off of Oak Hill Road) gathered to work on improving the clearance along their narrow gravel road. On Saturday, they limbed branches that were encroaching into the roadway and removed some of the smaller trees right along the road in order to provide clearance of five feet on each side of the road and vertical clearance of about 15 feet. Then, on Sunday, they rented a chipper (using funds received through a grant from State Farm and the National Fire Protection Association) and chipped

the limbs and branches that had been cut the previous day. The neighbors still have work to do, but the combined effort really made a difference and has put them on the path to improving emergency egress and access for emergency vehicles. It was also a great chance for neighbors to get to know each other better.



Fire season has arrived in full force. Here are some websites that can help you keep track of what is happening nearby, and around our state. They also can help you figure out where smoke is coming from.

#### California Wildfire Map

Provided by the LA Times, this interactive map shows where each fire is located and provides up-to-date statistics.

#### Air Quality Map

The AirNow sensor data pilot project is designed to provide information on smoke danger. It gives real time levels of particulate pollution in the air during wildfires for any location. It combines government and private air sensors.

#### ALERTWildfire

Enables you to view live wildfire video images from cameras in many locations in our region, including smoke.

#### Pyregence Wildfire Forecasts

This website uses a wide range of data-driven models to forecast wildfire weather, fuels and risks.

# SIGN UP FOR **CODERED** BEFORE AN EMERGENCY

The El Dorado County Sheriff uses the CODE RED service to notify you of an evacuation or other emergency (such as hazardous spill or urgent law enforcement operations), but the service doesn't work if you don't sign up! With CodeRED, you set up an account, select your communication preferences, such as cell phone, landline, text or email. Once set up, you receive emergency notifications as soon as they are sent.
